We are very excited to be taking part in the Carnegies shadowing scheme again. The Carnegies are the UK's longest running and best-loved book awards for children and young people and aim to spark a lifelong passion for reading by connecting more children with books that will change lives.

The 2025 Carnegie Medal for Writing shortlist has been whittled down from 19 longlist titles. Those students embarking on the shadowing scheme will help to determine the overall winner as they will play a part in 'shadowing' the judging process, whereby they read, discuss and review the books on the shortlists, get involved in reading related activities in groups, and vote for their favourite books. **Will you vote for the winner?**

World Book Day was celebrated on 6th March this year and this event was celebrated in various forms across the school, from dress-up day, Masked Reader Door "book cover" designs and McGrammar in the library.
